# AFFORDABLE ELECTRICITY POWERS QUALITY OF LIFE



### BOARD BRIEFS | August 30, 2021 Meeting

- Ryan Wagner presented an update to the Board on modifications to ACEC's solar application process.
   The Board approved a \$250 "trip fee" for any additional service trip (beyond the first) to certify and connect a solar system.
- The Board received an Annual Meeting presentation from Jenny McIntyre.
- Brenda Hackman gave an "Operation Round Up" presentation. The Board approved the application for the Co-op's involvement in the program, which involves the formation of a charitable foundation.
- An exception to Policy 7.6 was approved by the Board to allow for a part-time, temporary employee, related to a full-time employee, to work for the Co-op.
- The Board approved revisions and modifications to Policies 6.2 (use of Computer Systems, Electronic Equipment and Communication Systems), 6.3 and 6.4 (use of Social Media).
- The Board approved the membership fee to Allamakee County Economic Development and Tourism.

indirectly, at almost all times. It's easy to take it for granted because, in our society, electricity is so abundant and available with the simple flip of a switch. That's called reliability, and it's a major priority of ours.



According to the Energy

Information Agency, the typical U.S. household now uses more air conditioning, appliances, and consumer electronics than ever before. The average home also contains 10 or more internet-connected devices. Considering everything that is powered by electricity, it's no wonder we occasionally might wince at our monthly bill. But keep in mind, it's no longer just the "light bill."

From the infrastructure of your home (appliances, water heater, and HVAC system) to charging your smartphones, computers, TV, and Wi-Fi router, your energy bill covers so much more than lighting. 1133-5

Today, there is more demand for electricity than ever before. At home, in schools and businesses, and commercial sectors such as transportation, the need for electricity is increasing. Typically, when demand goes up, so does the price, as with most goods or services, like cable or even your favorite takeout meal. However, that's not true with electricity. So let's take a look at how the value of electricity compares to other everyday expenses.

Over the last five years, the cost of rent increased 3.4%, medical care increased 2.8%, and education increased 2.2%. But the cost of electricity only increased 1%. So considering all the ways we depend on electricity, it remains a great value. I am known to frequently say, "You'll pay more for two specialty drinks at Starbucks than you will for a days worth of electricity to your home."

So, the next time you're enjoying your favorite podcast, TV series, or movie, consider the value of electricity and how it enhances your quality of life.

We care about you, the members we serve, and understand that electricity is more than a commodity—it's a necessity. That's why Allamakee-Clayton Electric Cooperative will continue working hard to power your life reliably and affordably.

# PLUGGED IN Electric Vehicle Update

The Cooperative intends to share things we are learning about our electric vehicle; a Tesla Model 3 purchased this spring. Below are typical questions we are receiving about our EV and the answers we can now share with you:

### WHAT IS THE RANGE?

Battery electric vehicles are very efficient, and most newer models have enough range to satisfy the needs of a typical driver for multiple days without fully recharging. For example, the range of our standard battery in our Tesla Model 3 is 265 miles with a 100% battery charge and the maximum range suggested for a "trip". Additionally, Tesla suggests charging the battery daily from 50% to 90% capacity to maximize the battery's life.

#### HOW LONG DOES IT TAKE TO CHARGE THE CAR?

The time depends on the size of the charger and the duration. The general guideline for each kW of charger rating is to multiply that by 3 to 3.5 miles for each hour you are charging. So, for example, if you are charging with a 10kW charger for 1 hour, you can expect to drive 30 to 35 miles for each hour charged.



Level three chargers start at a minimum of 50 kW in size up to 350 kW. Charging with a 100kW charge would take approximately 45 minutes to replenish the Co-op's EV if the battery was entirely out of charge. If you were

to charge your EV with a 350kW charger, it would add 20 miles of range for every minute of charging. **5028** 

### WHERE CAN I CHARGE?

Currently, in the state of Iowa, there are 10 Tesla superchargers. The easiest way to locate a charger is through an app or your vehicle's information system.

Level two charging locations are too many to list and growing by the day. The easiest way to locate a Level 2 charger is through charging apps such as ChargePoint®, PlugShare, Charge-Hub, and EVgo.

Recently, the towns of Guttenberg and Marquette have added Level 2 chargers, and Allamakee-Clayton Electric is working on three possible locations within our service territory to place Level 2 chargers.

"Range anxiety" is the biggest hurdle we have heard the most so far. Still, with added chargers across the nation and battery technology improving, we believe things will only get easier for EV charging in the future.



Guided by our cooperative commitment to community, Allamakee-Clayton Electric Cooperative has a long history of supporting students in the communities we serve through scholarships and leadership opportunities. We've also been sending deserving high school students to our nation's capital every summer since 1960 as part of the national Electric Cooperative Youth Tour program.

Iowa's electric cooperatives are pleased to offer a new opportunity for rural students to learn more about advocacy, electric cooperative career opportunities and the cooperative business model with a three-part webinar series in October. The Iowa Youth Leadership Academy is open to any high school student in our service area, and they are invited to register at www.IowaYouthTour.com.

"This new program is really designed for rural Iowa students who have a passion for public service, leadership or government," remarked Hollee McCormick, General Manager. "We want to raise students' awareness of how local electric co-ops power people's lives and empower communities. We also want to talk about cooperative career paths that are available in smaller communities."

Once students register online for the Iowa Youth Leadership Academy, they can attend the webinars from their own computer or mobile device. Each Zoom session will last around 45-60 minutes and focus on a specific topic:

- Tuesday, Oct. 5, 7:00 p.m. Cooperative Business Model
- Thursday, Oct. 14, 7:00 p.m. Rural Iowa Advocacy
- Tuesday, Oct. 26, 7:00 p.m. Civic Involvement and Leadership

At the end of each live session, one lucky attendee will be selected at random to win a pair of Apple AirPods. Students who attend all three sessions will be entered into a random drawing for a \$1,000 college scholarship.



During the Zoom sessions, students will be inspired by our line-up of speakers and presenters. Students will learn how to advocate for issues that are important to them and learn about leadership development from a motivational speaker. Attendees will also hear from former Iowa Youth Tour students who pursued their passion for government service and leadership after attending the weeklong trip to Washington, D.C. The 2022 Electric Cooperative Youth Tour is slated for June 18-24 next summer.


